H i everyone!

I wanted to share with you the financial results from the fiscal quarter ended February 28, 2023, and update you about changes in the accounting team.

We ended the quarter with \$245,000 in operating cash accounts and \$297,000 in short term investments. Total cash was down \$175,000 compared to the end of the 2022 fiscal year. This was largely due to catching up on our payables (we were behind in our payments to several vendors due to accounting staffing issues) and making a 50% deposit on our roof repairs.

Our C-Dock expenditures reached almost \$800,000 by the end of February. Currently it is virtually complete, at a cost of about \$950,000 as expected. This is mostly covered by the bank loan arranged last year.

We had an operating loss of about \$4,000 for the first quarter. This compares with a loss of \$34,000 for the same period last year. We had \$660,000 in revenue compared to \$605,000 for last year. Much of the improvement was in member revenue and bar sales.

Total expenses were up \$13,000, to \$550,000. However, operating expenses were up \$26,000 (some due to catching up on late 2022 invoices), partially offset by savings from having no 50th Anniversary costs this year.

Overall, it was a good quarter for the Club. We had no surprises in the cost of the dock replacement or roof repairs. We are looking forward to the implementation of *Club Essential*, the new dining and bar Point of Sale system. There may be some confusion during the first few weeks (what else is new?), but for the accounting side, it promises to provide better operating and financial reports, as well as improved billing procedures.

My last article, back in January, described the search for a fulltime accounting assistant. *Karina Galarza* is now finishing her first week and we are very happy to welcome her aboard! We are all looking forward to having a new team member



who will help us improve member services relating to financial record keeping and billing. As always, you can communicate by contacting




CCYC Nautical Book Club



The Wave - Susan Casey



The Sea Detective - Mark Douglas-Home



Swimming to Antarctica - Lynne Cox

Lynne Cox writes about swimming the way Saint-Exupery wrote about flying, and one sees how swimming, like flying, can stretch the wings of the spirit. At 14, she swam 26 miles from Catalina Island to the mainland; at 15 & 16, she broke the men's and women's world records for swimming the English Channel; at 18, she swam the 20-mile Cook Strait between North and South Islands of New Zealand. She was *the first* to swim the Strait of Magellan (the world's most treacherous 3-mile stretch of water), the Bering Strait from Alaska to Siberia (opening the U.S.-Soviet border for the first time in 48 years), and the Cape of Good Hope. And finally she is the first person to have swum a mile in zero degree water in Antarctica.

Freshly brewed iced tea:

The cool thing about iced tea is that you can switch up the flavor and customize it – it just depends on the tea!

To brew the tea, you want to use a good quality black tea. My all-time favorite of all teas is *Harney and Sons* and I used to drive up the coast to the *Four Seasons Laguna Niguel's* gift shop to buy it!

1. Seep tea for 15 minutes and let cool before putting in the fridge to chill

Recipe

- 1. Massage lemons this helps to release juice
- 2. 1 dozen juiced lemons pour into pitcher
- 3. Add 8 cups ice cold water
- 4. Make a simple syrup: 1 ½ cup sugar and 1 cup water. Bring to a boil until sugar has dissolved and let cool, then add to lemon juice water mix
- 5. Combine lemon juice with simple syrup
